Revolutionary tribunals

The Revolutionary Tribunals (in French, tribunals révolutionnaire) were politically motivated courts formed by the National Convention in 1793. As the Reign of Terror unfolded, these tribunals abandoned legal rights and procedures to increase their output, becoming veritable engines of death.

Reign of Terror | History, Significance, & Facts

Reign of Terror, period of the French Revolution from September 5, 1793, to July 27, 1794, during which the Revolutionary government decided to take harsh measures against those suspected of being enemies of the Revolution (nobles, priests, and hoarders). In Paris a wave of executions followed.

If any king could have coped with the French Revolution it was not Louis XVI. He was 19 when he succeeded his grandfather, Louis XV, in 1774. At 15 he had married the Austrian Habsburg princess Marie-Antoinette, who was 14. Louis was initially unable to consummate the marriage and, deeply unsure of himself, he hid his lack of confidence behind a haughty demeanour.
