MLA In-Text Citation Examples

Exercise instructions (MLA)

For each question:

- 1. Read the source description.
- 2. Write each prompt in both MLA parenthetical and MLA narrative (citation in prose) form.
- 3. Use your MLA citation guide to check that your style is correct.

Key MLA reminders:

- MLA in-text citations normally use author's last name and page number, with no comma between them.
- If there is no page number (e.g., many websites), include only what you have (usually the author's last name or a shortened title).
- For three or more authors, list the first author's last name followed by "et al."

Item 1 - One author, parenthetical and narrative

Source:

- Author: Jordan Lee
- Year: 2022 (not included in MLA in-text)
- Idea: "Regular sleep improves academic performance in high school students."

Write:

- MLA parenthetical citation example (author and page, if page exists).
- MLA narrative citation example using Lee in the sentence and page at the end.

Item 2 - Two authors, parenthetical and narrative

Source:

- Authors: Morgan Smith and Priya Patel
- Year: 2020 (not included in MLA in-text)
- Idea: "Daily reading increases vocabulary growth in middle school students."

Write:

- MLA narrative citation example, naming both Smith and Patel in your sentence and adding the page number in parentheses.
- MLA parenthetical citation example with both last names joined by "and" plus the page number.

Item 3 – Three or more authors, parenthetical and narrative

Source:

- Authors: Taylor Green, Alex Chen, and Samira Lopez
- Year: 2019 (not included in MLA in-text)
- Idea: "Participating in group projects can improve collaboration skills."

Write:

- MLA parenthetical citation example using the first author's last name followed by "et al." and the page number.
- MLA narrative citation example using Green et al. in the sentence, with the page number in parentheses.
